The Photo Metaphor Card Sort (PMCS) is a new and unique approach to self-awareness using a visual medium. Clients choose photos that resonate for them and become more aware of their values, motivations, and activities that are meaningful. Participants will learn how to use PMCS to elicit self-concept themes including identity insecurities, body image issues, dependent attachment issues and family systems issues. They will learn how to connect the elicited themes to early recollections, clearly defining the problems faced.

Learn to use a social construction model with the PMCS for a clear picture of clients' current problems, and also as a means to help clients master them. PMCS works for teens through adults. Experiential activities in working with clients will provide training in the many ways to help clients to verbalize their inner wishes, dreams, and concerns. Price includes a PMCS set.
